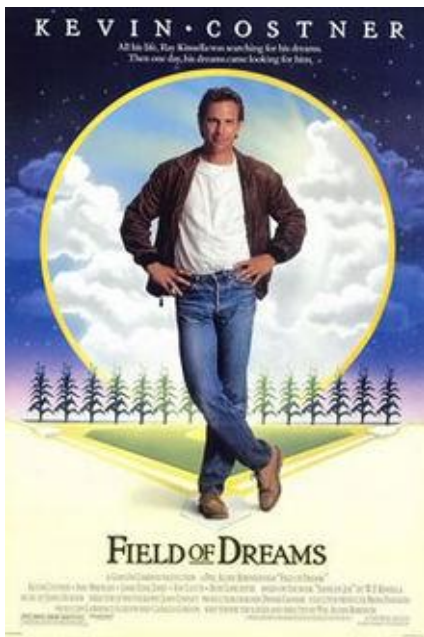

One of our Saturday movies will be A Field of Dreams. Here is a little background on the making of the movie and what it's about.

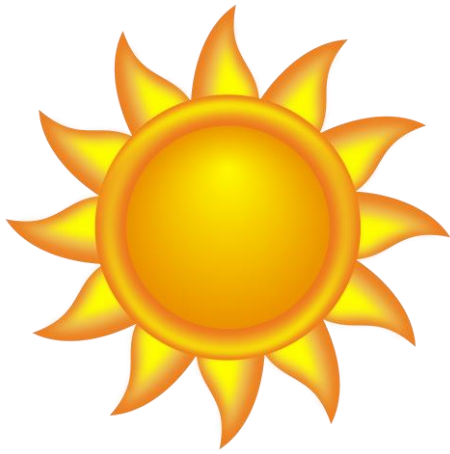
The movie was made in 1989. It is an American sports fantasy drama which was adapted by W.P. Kinsella's 1982 novel *Shoeless Joe*. The film stars Kevin Costner, Amy Madigan, James Earl Jones, Ray Liotta and Burt Lancaster in his final film role. It was nominated for three Academy Awards, including for Best Original Score, Best Adapted Screenplay and Best Picture. In 2017, the film was selected for preservation in the United States National Film Registry by the Library Of Congress as being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant."

The movie is about a farmer Ray Kinsella, who lives in Iowa. One day as he's walking through the field, he hears a voice whispering, "If you build it, he will come." This phrase was regarding his troubled relationship that Ray had with his late father. He sees a vision of a baseball diamond in his field and the great Shoeless Joe Jackson. He figures if he builds the baseball field, Shoeless Joe, whom his father idolized, can play baseball again.

The field that was in the movie has been kept up and is in Dyersville, Iowa. The field was sold on October 31, 2011, to Go The Distance Baseball, LLC, for an undisclosed fee, believed to be around \$ 5.4 million. In June 2008, after having polled over 1,500 people in the creative community, AFI revealed that Field Of Dreams is in "Ten Top Ten" list- the best ten films in ten "classic" American film genre.

Nailed it!

In preparation for the footloose and barefoot days of summer, June 1 is Nail Polish Day. While today's nail art is largely a reflection of personal style, when it originated nearly 5,000 years ago in Babylonia, nail polish was a marker in social status and class. Babylonian warriors ground *kohl*, a charcoal-like mineral, into a dark powder and used it to color their nails and lips before going out to battle. The dark shade signified a high rank. Similarly, around 3000 BC, the Chinese used varying nail colors to signify differences in rank and dynasty. Rulers often wore bright colors like red, gold, or silver, while lower classes could be punished if they dared wear colors deemed acceptable only to the ruling class. It wasn't until much later, in 19th- century Paris, when manicure parlors became fashionable and women regularly began to "get their nails done." In 1878, an American named Mary Cobb, after learning the art of the manicure in Paris, opened a shop in New York City., America's first nail salon called "Mrs. Pray's Manicure." Cobb would go on to open a series of salons, invents the emery board, and market an entire line of nail products. Cobb was truly the mother of the nail salon industry.

In the United States, Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777 by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that officially established June 14 as Flag Day; on August 3, 1949, National Flag Day was established by an Act of Congress. It is not an official federal holiday.
